

"The Bob said, in part, International Brotherhood of Magicians was founded in 1922. It is the world's largest organization dedicated to the art of magic, with members in 40 countries. The 9,000 members include professional. semi-professional, amateur magicians and enthusiastic magic hobbyists from all walks of life. The 365 local branches of the I.B.M. are called Rings and they meet each month. The National Capital Ring 50 meets right here in the Holiday Inn the first Wednesday of each month. Ring 50 has a youth group called the Counts of Conjuring and meets at 6:00 PM the first Wednesday of each month. The I.B.M. offers many outstanding benefits, but among the most important are the opportunities to grow in magic and to have fun with

President Lipman then introduced Lt. Noland the Magician (Noland Montgomery) led off the entertainment with a demonstration of controlled pandemonium as the kids reacted to his provocative These centered on a antics. seemingly inexhaustible supply of gags produced from his hat: A Wand that changed to bread, toilet plunger), paper (and toilet multiplying hot dogs, a banana, a spring wand, giant comb and toothbrush, a silk that had just been vanished, and less-than-pristine socks and underwear. One running gag involved the frequent discovery of donuts in kid's ears. The last item to appear from Noland's hat was Rocky the Raccoon who, in addition to annoving Noland, helped present a routine with a floppy rope that mysteriously became stiff as a board.

After Noland had taken his bow and the noise had abated somewhat, it was the turn for:

Captain Token the Magician (**Louis Hofheimer**). Louis lit a torch on fire, paused, and suddenly it became a beautiful silvery cane! Next, he showed how to tie a "square" knot in a piece of rope and then opened up his wallet unleashing another burst of fire.

With the aid of several kids Louis cut a long piece of rope in half and then tied two ends together and claimed it had been "restored". The kids were not fooled; but then he wrapped the rope around his fist, made a magical gesture and when he removed the rope it had, in fact been made whole again. Louis again revealed his pyromaniac tendencies by opening a book and allowing another blaze of fire to momentarily spring from its center. Then, from a clearly empty paper bag, Louis pulled three beautiful corsages inside clear plastic boxes, drawing gasps from the audience. Captain Token the Magician ended by encircling two volunteers in ropes. With the help of **Matthew Nichols**, a Count of Conjuring, the ropes were given a vigorous yank and seemed to melt away, freeing the captives. Last up:

Louis The Magician (Louis Meyer) - opened with a "Psychic Arrow" - a test to make sure the kids could see him clearly. As long as the arrow pointed up it was a sign all was well. However, the kids began screaming as the arrow went haywire and pointed in all different directions although every time Louis checked it was pointing up. Eventually he opened the arrow up to reveal a huge pair of spectacles so that "somebody" could get it right. Louis then turned to a box labelled "COOP" and said it was occupied by "Sidney the Chicken" who could be heard clucking inside. Sidney (so-named though not a Rooster) finally appeared in the box to take part in a magic trick involving different colored eggs.

Sidney was blindfolded and a yellow egg was selected by an audience member. During this action Sidney tried to cheat with the blindfold but was found out and reprimanded by Louis the Magician. All three eggs went into the henhouse and Sidney went to work to find the selection. More cackling and squawking was heard and then an egg shot up out of the henhouse - wrong color! Sidney tried again with the same result. After more hilarious byplay the front door of the henhouse opened and out rolled a giant yellow egg! Sidney took a well-deserved bow amid a wave of loud applause. Louis the Magician then apologized to the audience because Frosty the Snowman, who was supposed to make a surprise appearance, had failed to show up. As he said this, the lid to a box set off to the side began to slowly open by itself. Screaming kids tried to alert Louis but he seemed not to hear. The lid opened more and a white shape began to slowly bulge and grow until it was an immense Frosty himself, all decked out with scarf, top hat and carrot for a nose! - a killer ending for the Holiday show.



Richie Klein: How appropriate that Richie, our in-house Santa Claus for the Holiday Magic Show, was able to share his background with our readers:

Ring 50 New Members & Applications & Dues




Have YOU brought a prospective member to the meeting? They must be interested in magic and be a member of the International Brotherhood of Magicians.

Put Ace thru King of any suit (sav Hearts) on bottom of deck. Ace on bottom. Shuffle, controlling the bottom cards in place. Spread, ask spectator to select a card. Cards are cut at that point and spectator's card is placed on top half, then the bottom half on top of that, thus putting the AH next to the selection. Spectator cuts about 1/3 off the top of the face down cards, and then cuts again about 2/3s. Cards are turned face up and more cuts are made until a heart appears. The value of that card equals the location of the selection counting down in the deck. (Ex. If the JH shows up the card is 11th from the top). Make up any story you like for having him count down. (Editors Note: You could riffle or spread the deck facing you to "memorize" it. Ask the spectator to name his card, then count down to where you "remember" it is.)

Counts of Conjuring Meets January 3, 6:00pm



The International Brotherhood of Magicians, National Capitol Ring 50, "Counts of Conjuring" meets first Wednesday of every month at the Holiday Inn Alexandria–Carlyle, 2460 Eisenhower Ave, Alexandria, VA at 6:00pm. The "Counts" is a way for youths to learn about magic and the performance of magic.

Louis the Magician teaches the *Discover Magic* course. This is an amazing course that not only will teach the youths magic but will also teach them important "life-skills". This class is normally taught in after-school programs and summer camps and costs \$275 per child but will be FREE for the Counts of Conjuring (only cost is \$35 for the actual magic tricks).

Each month the youths will learn one new magic trick and have a chance to perform it.

The Counts of Conjuring is for youths 8 to 17 years.
