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# March Meeting Highlights

President Larry welcomed a near standing-room only gathering of Ring 50 members for a night of magic featuring a lecture by Mike Hummer, a long-time demonstrator at Al's Magic Shop and a 35-year veteran of children's magic. Before inviting Mike to begin, Larry introduced his visiting nephew from Israel, **Adi Liron**, who is also a magician.

### **Announcements**

Chuck Jones extended an invitation to all to come to the Annual Banquet of Ring 94 in Hagerstown, MD on June 27. Tickets will be from \$45 to \$50 dollars each but that could change. Stay tuned.

Larry Lipman reminded the audience that the program in April will be the Dan Lacey Contest for Magician of the Year. Dan Lacey, was President of Ring 50 (1999-00) who died of cancer about that same time. Larry recalled that Dan is remembered as a charismatic magician who "Could Light up a Room". He said Ring 50 created the Contest to declare the winner of a night of magical performances held in Dan's Honor.

The 50/50 raffle was won by **Danny Selnick** who walked away with the princely sum of \$14.00. President Lipman then invited

John Roberts to perform a mentalism trick that John was supposed to have done last month for Mentalism night but got lost in the shuffle. John invited Chuck Jones to select one symbol from a pack of ESP cards as John turned his back and place it on an easel so the face could not be seen. John then called for the lights to be dimmed. John brought out an illuminated "Neutron Generator" which, in the dark, appeared as a large glass ball with eerie threads of lightning dancing inside. John and Chuck each placed a finger on the ball and a bridge of wavering energy appeared between them. John explained this was a neural pathway between himself and Chuck's mind where he searched for an image of the chosen symbol. A few moments later, the lights came back up and John looked through a packet of five ESP cards and displayed an ESP symbol he had found in Chuck's mind - and this matched the one Chuck had placed on the easel!



Mike took the stage and opened by describing his very first Magic show for kids: it was a group of sixyear-old girls in a suburb and it went so well Mike had visions of easy money. His next show was for 10-year-olds in N.E. Washington and Mike said that was an entirely different story - disaster! That happened 35 years ago and Mike drew on his experiences over the years to illustrate tips on doing kid's magic. He stressed the utility of what he called "Bullet-proof" Magic tricks that can survive unexpected challenges. To illustrate, he showed his favorite opener, Dan Tong's Gag Bag which he said always got a great response and, as an added benefit, helped identify those kids likely to be good assistants.

Mike showed other tricks in this "Bullet-proof" category; Chinese Sticks, Tricky Bottles and the Hat Tear. Mike went on to demonstrate

many good children's tricks and also some for adults. These included Rising Card, Color Changing Rope, Ribbon Thru Body, Acrobatic Knot, Popcorn Box and many more. Along the way, Mike demonstrated some fine points in handling and presentation of these tricks which he also had for sale after the lecture.

His audience greatly enjoyed seeing Mike, a familiar local magician and dealer who had clearly learned a lot from his former boss, Al Cohen. He said when he started out, he also had learned much about kid's magic from Al's son and co-demonstrator, Stan, whom Mike had seen perform a number of times. Mike added that he had spoken the day before with Al, who is retired in Florida, and that the 92-year-old legend "Is doing well."



## Who is who in Ring 50

Craig Fifer: When I was seven, my family moved from New York City to Roanoke, in southwest Virginia. As luck would have it, David Copperfield performed in Roanoke two months later, and my parents took me to see the show. Perhaps that's what started my lifelong love of magic.

I was very fortunate to have a small magic shop down the street from my house, where my parents bought me some tricks and books. When I was 12, I joined I.B.M.



The Old Piano Trick John S. Roberts

This trick is so old (1900's) it has whiskers. **Larry West** showed it to me many years ago.

Have a spectator place all his fingers curled on a table as though in position to play the piano. Place a pair of cards between his/her right pinkie and ring finger, two cards in the next gap and so on until you reach the end of the left hand, where you place a single card between the left pinkie and ring finger noting there is one extra odd card. Pick up the two cards you first placed and begin to form two piles as you retrace your first steps. As you go, keep emphasizing you are putting down even pairs of cards and that you are left with the *odd* card. Ask on which pile they want to put the odd card, say, the one on the right. They do so and you use that pile to re-create the first steps, placing pairs of cards between the piano-playing fingers. It will turn out that the right hand now holds an even number of cards. The odd card has vanished from the chosen pile (!) and will end up in the left hand between the left pinkie and ring finger. If they pick the left-hand pile to receiver the odd card, start placing the pairs left to right to achieve the same result. The "secret" is that when they choose a pile for the odd card, each one has seven cards so no matter which one they choose, it will end up an even number and the other pile will contain the odd card. Sprinkle your patter with musical references i.e. "Which hand do you want to play the odd note? Now the musical becomes magical"...etc. etc.

Ring 222 in Roanoke. The grownups didn't quite know what to do with me, and I lacked the discipline to study and practice on my own. (This is one reason I'm so proud of Ring 50's Counts of

For the next 25 years, there were no significant developments in my magic journey. In late 2016, I saw Steve Brundage perform Rubik's Cube routine on America's Got Talent, and I was in awe. I looked him up, and was amazed to find I could actually purchase his trick. It turns out that somewhere along the way, magic found the Internet. I was overwhelmed by the sheer volume of information and products available online, and I started to rediscover my childhood hobby. I had the chance to visit The Magic Castle in early 2017, and I was hooked. I joined Ring 50 in 2017. renewing my I.B.M. membership for the first time since 1990.

By day, I'm the Director of Communications and Public Information for the City of Alexandria, where I've lived since 2003. I'm no stranger to public speaking, having delivered hundreds and hundreds of conference interviews and But when I was presentations. asked to participate in new member night in November -- my first-ever magic performance for strangers -- I was terrified. Despite choosing a and effect developing great engaging patter, I lost a pinky break and the rest of the performance was a cascade of follies. It was an important lesson in mastering the basics before worrying about anything else.

I'm very grateful for the warm I've received welcome from everyone in the Ring. I've had the opportunity to contribute creating a new combined website for the Ring and Magi-Whirl, and the Magi-Whirl working on planning committee. I look forward to continuing to be an active member of Ring 50!
