Magi-Whirl 2019

By now everyone has recovered from the two day celebration of the magical arts by the International Brotherhood of Magicians, National Capital Ring 50, *Magi-Whirl 2019* that was held on April 12 & 13, 2019.

Convention Co-Chairman Craig Fifer reports there were 110 convention attendees from around the mid-Atlantic Region that converged on Alexandria, VA and over 600 show attendees. This was a special year for Magi-Whirl because the event venue graduated from school classrooms and auditoriums to the prestigious Rachel M Schlesinger Concert Hall and Arts Center in Alexandria.

Michael Finney, the current International President of I.B.M. led the list of world-class lecturers and performers and was also the host of the Gala Public Show which capped the festivities. Ring 50's own Bob Patterson was Michael's predecessor International as President which made this Magi-Whirl even more special. The Arts Center, with its spacious rooms was ideal for the nine dealers who hawked their wares behind crowded tables

There were four lectures, and a Gala evening show. Everyone had had a great time hanging out with other magicians and people devoted to magic. They learned a ton of new tricks, ideas, presentations, and of course seen some great performances and lecturers.

The Lectures

Michael Finney leading off the lectures on Friday night regaled his audience with tales from his forty-some years in the magic business, including working on cruise ships, TV specials and as a stand-up comedian. Michael started his superlative lecture by encouraging magicians to improve their routines using creative thinking.

By adding charismatic storytelling and revising classic effects, the magic can be elevated to a new level. After spending part of his early career as a close-up magician and children's а performer at a theme park, Michael decided to concentrate strictly on comedy magic. Along the way, he opened for Ray Charles and worked President George W. Bush's inaugural Gala.

Michael's lecture ranged far and wide over the magic landscape, displaying his unique brand of offbeat humor. He also taught the workings of several tricks including his signature rope routine with its hilarious patter.

Saturday morning began with Christopher T. Magician, a published author of books on Children's Magic, impressed his audience with a clear, well-organized list of proven techniques for entertaining kids and adults as

well. The techniques and silliness Christopher put forth in his books were honed over fifteen years of performing magic for children at parties and other special events. One example is "Don't": Tell the kid not to open the can of Pringles - and of course they will. By the time Christopher was finished with this bit there were "snakes" all over the platform. Another is "Subvert Expectations": You blow up a balloon and it bursts before the magician (and the audience) expect it to. Or, your trick fails for some reason and as you turn away, the balloon explodes after the expected moment. Christopher's lecture later was deemed the most entertaining and informative of all.

Before the lunch break it was Gustavo Raley from Buenos Aires, Argentina where he began his with artistic career live performances at the age of four. As one of the most awarded illusionists in Latin America, Raley has brought his magic to more than 30 countries around the world. His lecture consisted of performing and explaining six ingenious effects he designed and patented that are sold all over the world. The most jawdropping of these was when he poured three different colored sodas into an empty ice bucket. Swished them around and scooped them out as clear and unmixed as when they went in. Then he did it again, even more baffling! When the lecture over, audience members was clustered two and three deep to acquire Gustavo's miracle tricks. When his English occasionally failed him, he was helped with

translations by Ring 50 Secretary Marc Carrion who is from Barcelona, Spain.

After the break it was Eric Jones. Eric was a very fortunate last-minute substitute for scheduled coin expert David Roth who could not attend due to a serious illness. Eric is a master coin manipulator whose methods are not for beginners or even mid-level devotees to coins. It was fascinating see his deeply detailed demonstration of just one trick, "Three Coins Across" which took up nearly one hour of his lecture. Eric finished by performing closeup card magic encircled by his audience, most of which stood on chairs to watch.

Magi-Whirl attendees were extremely happy with our lecturers and performers, who all delivered the goods! For the most part the lectures were not a dealer demo, but a lecture about their techniques experiences life as performing magician. However they did have some merchandise to sell at the lecture or dealer hall. The lectures were about the art of magic and were outstanding.

The Dealers

During unscheduled periods the bustling dealer's hall was the scene of much warm fellowship. Attendees embraced old friends; tricks were shared along with chitchat about the world of magic.








Saturday Night Gala Show

When it was time for the doors to open for the public Gala Show, more than 600 men, women and children began streaming into the Schlesinger Concert Hall to find their assigned seats. Six strolling magicians (Matt Biegun, Louis Hofheimer, Chuck Jones, Larry Lipman, Noland Montgomery, Dwight Redman and Barney Sperling) mingled among them doing tricks and heightening expectations for the entertainment to come.

The show opened with welcoming remarks by emcee Michael Finney. International President of the I.B.M. who performed the spinning spiral effect that first caused his head to shrink and then swell back to normal size. The audience gasped and then laughed at this weird collective illusion. Michael also thanked Dan Dalton who was at one end of the first row of seats providing sign language interpretation of the show.

To begin the Gala Show Michael introduced the perfect opening act: an astonishing display of juggling by Niels Duinker from the Netherlands. Niels had dreamed becoming successful international performer since he was 12 years old. Over the last 18 years he has turned that dream into a reality by winning gold medals at juggling major and circus competitions in Europe, Asia and capturing America, and imagination of audiences around the world. Niels seemed to fill the air above him with balls, rings and clubs that were packed with LED lights and created a brilliant color kaleidoscope of illuminated movement. It was easy to see why this young man is a four-time Guinness Worlds Record holder juggling seven items at one time.

Emcee Finney then brought on stage **Christopher T. Magician** who performed the classic "Bill in

Lemon" trick but there was nothing classic about it. Working with a volunteer, Christopher failed to find the lemon with the vanished bill inside, first from among several lemons and then from lemons hidden all over the auditorium. This frantic but futile search escalated until Christopher upended his suitcase and dozens of lemons poured out. By then the stage was awash with lemons and the audience was howling with laughter. The vanished bill was finally found in the cap of a Sharpie that was in the purse of a woman in the audience! Christopher ended by emulating the famous "bullet catch" trick. He first hid a marked coin) (the bullet) in a roll of toilet paper (the cartridge) and loading the roll on a leaf blower (the gun). Samantha Levin aimed the gun at Christopher and fired. Something went wrong and toilet paper unwound in stream that reached across and entirely blanketed the magician who ended up looking like a snowman. Christopher uncovered his face and removed the marked coin from his mouth! A clean-up crew carted off the debris which included Christopher T. Magician himself – to thunderous applause.

Between some of the acts and set changes, Finney entertained "in front of the curtain" with the rope trick from his lecture and his hilarious "Card on the Forehead".

Christophe Jelenski was next on the program. He had earned a spot in the Gala by winning Ring 50's "Magician of the Year Award" for 2018-19. Chris is a close-up magician and mentalism who has given several TED talks in the region. He had a young volunteer page through a magazine and pick out the longest word in the first sentences which Chris intuited correctly as "Grandchildren". He then had lady and a gentleman come to the stage and sat them both well apart in chairs. While they closed their eye he touched the gentleman in several ways; on the shoulder, the top of the head, etc. and each time the lady reported feeling the identical touches even though Chris had been nowhere near her. Christophe brought off seemingly impossible feat with aplomb and earned a hearty round of applause.

Next up was **Jessica Jane**, a *TMT Entertainment Awards Magical Entertainer of the Year* and a first-class entertainer whose parents came from the world of magic and put her in their act at the age of 12. At 17 she joined the circus where she learned the ins and outs of fire-eating and other vaudeville stunts.

Jessica opened by pouring water into a folded newspaper and then turning it upside down to show the water had vanished. Returning the paper right side up, the water poured out – where had it been? Jessica then demonstrated her circus roots by escaping from a tightly laced straight-jacket in record time. She finished with a lovely version of "Gypsy Thread" using the image of magic as a tightrope: "Walking a tightrope is living – all the rest is just waiting".

To bring the Gala Show to a memorable end, Gustavo Ralev performed the "Cocktail" trick from his lecture using the ice bucket and three different colored sodas. He followed this with a trick with a signed card that mysteriously ended up on a Selfie Stick - but the best was yet to come. Gustavo is a master of shadow puppetry, the seldom seen art of using just your hands to depict lifelike images in black silhouette on a lighted screen. With the house lights down, Gustavo created a wondrous series of incredibly creative shadow

images of animals, people and short dramatic scenarios. He ended with a love story in shadows that brought the audience to its feet with applause and cheers — an ovation that rocked the hall. It was a fitting end to one of the best Magi-Whirl Gala shows in recent memory.


Each month the youths will learn one new magic trick and have a chance to perform it. The Counts of Conjuring is for youths 8 to 17 years.

April Quickie
