Chris Capehart to Lecture May 5

Master magician Chris Capehart, who also was a "Fool Us" winner recently, will lecture for Ring 50 at our May 5 meeting.

Chris is an old friend of Ring 50 and performed at Magi-Whirl in 201?. He is an acclaimed children's performer and has been doing magic for more than 50 years. His ring routine is legendary. So is his comedy.

On "Fool Us" he did three routines including a "Jedi Card Trick" in which he made a card fall down just by pointing at it and popped one balloon inside another one—magically. The balloon trick is the one that Penn and Teller said they were fooled by, but Chris isn't sure they really knew how he did any of the tricks.



Chris began his magic career with a performance at the legendary Apollo Theater in Harlem in 1969 when he was 19 years old. He later performed as a street magician in Philadelphia and New York City.

He has performed at The Magic Castle, Monday Night Magic in New York City, in Las Vegas and at the Blackpool Magic Convention in Blackpool, England.

Alejandro Navas' Card Lecture Breaks the Screen Barrier

For Ring 50's meeting on February 3. our guest lecturer was Alejandro Navas. Alejandro is а

professional magician, producer from and actor

Costa Rica who has transformed virtual magic with his "Evolution Project," which features magic that works beautifully in virtual performances. Many of the tricks are versions of classic card effects but instead of the magician handling the cards, the participant makes the magic happen in their own hands with

their own cards.

Αt our meeting, Alejandro showed and explained five tricks. For the first one, Alejandro wrote prediction

on the back of a black slate with a piece of chalk. He had member

Chuck Jones help choose a random card. This card matched the prediction written on the slate.

Next, Alejandro performed a do-as-I-do trick he calls "Empathy." Chuck chose a card his own deck while Alejandro did the same. The cards matched!

Alejandro showed us what he

does if the spectator forgets their card or something goes wrong with a trick. He keeps a bulldog clip hanging from an elastic band around his neck at all times. A folded piece of paper is held in the clip. When the paper removed from the clip and unfolded, written on it will be any card the spectator may have just named.

For the next trick, an impressive ambitious card and two card transposition combination, member Marc

Carrion was the assistant. Marc used his own deck and followed the instructions Alejandro gave him to choose and mark a card without actually looking at it. This was mixed into the deck and then Marc chose another card from his deck that he did look at.

Somehow, the marked card rose to the top of Marc's deck.

Alejandro then took a card from the top of his own deck and Marc did the same. He asked Marc to hold the card between his hands. It seemed impossible that Marc could be holding the same card he had looked at earlier, since it had been mixed into the deck.

Alejandro showed Marc the card he had taken, which was not the one Marc had chosen. But then, Alejandro's transformed into Marc's card. When Marc opened his hands, he found he was holding the same card Alejandro had chosen. The two cards had switched places!

The last trick was an ace assembly. Alejandro removed the four aces from his deck and laid them in a row. Marc did the same with his cards and laid his aces to mirror Alejandro's. They both dealt three indifferent cards onto each of the aces.

Alejandro Navas' Virtual Card Magic

The last trick was an ace assembly. Alejandro removed the four aces from his deck and laid them in a row. Marc did the same with his cards and laid his aces to mirror Alejandro's. They both dealt three indifferent cards onto each of the aces. After some mixing and redealing of the piles, they both picked up the pile containing the ace of

spades, "the most important ace." Marc was told to sit on that pile. One by one,

the aces vanished from the remaining three piles from both Alejandro and Marc's decks. The aces were found together with the ace of spades in Alejandro's pile and also in the pile Marc was sitting on!

We were lucky to have Marc, a native of Spain, to translate for us during the explanations as Alejandro is not very comfortable with English. These

tricks were the result of a challenge Alejandro set for himself sometime before the pandemic. He gave himself three restrictions: he would

not touch the cards, he would not use gimmicks, and the effects would not be pick-a-

card tricks. He imagined doing these tricks in person but with the participant sitting some distance away and doing all the handling of the cards. Alejandro became frustrated and put the project away for a while. After Covid hit, he realized it was a good time to return to the challenge. He thought if he didn't find a solution, some other magician would. This gave him hope that this kind of magic would be possible and he persevered, eventually creating these tricks and others which make up his "Evolution Project," which is available to magicians through several online magic dealers.

The methods are very clever, relying more on mental misdirection and the creation of false memories than sleight of hand. These tricks work because of careful construction and scripting which allow the magic to happen in the mind of the spectator. Since the magician can't actually touch the participant's cards, the wording and communication are crucial to the success of the tricks. These are good concepts to keep in mind with any kind of magic performance whether on Zoom or in person.

Tommy Halladay – Magic Without Trick Photography

Hello, my name is Tommy Halladay. I'm 24 years old currently and livina Alexandria and teaching preschool. I first got into magic when I was about 10 years old. My family took a trip to New York City and one day we went to the huge Toys-R-Us store that used to be in Times Square. There is where I bought my first magic kit. I probably learned no more than three or four tricks from the 100-trick kit. but seeing how those few tricks

I joined Ring 50 when I was about 12 years old after meeting Danny Selnick. Danny had a huge part in getting me into the magic community. The main genre of magic I perform would have to be close-up/street magic. I love performing live for people, but I also love to create magic videos for social media. When I was in high school, I started a series of videos on my Instagram called

amazed people is what got me hooked.

Magic Monday's.

When I first started performing magic for video/social media, I was just sitting in my bedroom filming me doing quick visual tricks on my cellphone. As time went on, the quality of my videos and magic would get better. I graduated high school and then went to Northern Virginia Community College for a degree in Photography & Media. While I was studying photography, I thought it would be a fun challenge to try and incorporate magic in with photography.



I then learned to perform short magic tricks for video, and then I went to learn to perform a magic trick in a photo. This is how I started my project, "No PhotoShop."

My goal was to create magical photos that looked like they were created using PhotoShop, but not using PhotoShop at all. It was a tough challenge.

I went from performing magic live with real people and it was all about the experience. Now I had to

create something magical in a still image. A lot of magic involves many movements, moments, talking and distracting. I couldn't do any of these. I had to

take what I knew from performing magic and learn to take many magical moments and freeze them into one visual moment.

I continued this project through many of my semesters at college and I still graduated.

Color Face

Effect: Predict what poker chip color the spectator will

select.

Method: The effect is based on two principles. The Gypsy peek and the magician's choice. Hand four different



color poker chips to the spectator. While she is examining the chips, write down any of the colors--we will use Red for this explanation. Put the prediction away but in a place that is obvious you



can not reach and change. Cover your eyes with your left hand and extend the right hand to a position where you can see using the Gypsy peek. Ask the spectator to hand you two of the chips.

- 1. If he hands you the Red and another one, ask him to put the ones he is holding in his pocket and ask him to take one of the ones in your hand.
 - a. If he takes the Red, put the other one away.
- b. If he takes the other one, ask him to put it away and then ask him to hold the one you are left with.
- 2. If he handed two of the other colors, put them away in your pocket and ask him to hand you one more.
- a. If he hands you the Red, ask him to put the other one away.
- b. If he hands you the other one, put it away with the ones in your pocket.

At the end we are left with the Red poker chip.

You can now reveal the prediction, or do a little bit more of presentation. Use four questions and ask the spectator to say YES to all of them...

Did you pick the white chip? YES.

Did you pick the red chip? YES.

Did you pick the green chip?... and then eliminate two where you 'think' he lied.

Then ask them to answer NO to the next two questions.

Did you pick the red chip? NO.

Did you pick the blue chip? NO.

I see... it's not the blue... you picked the RED.

That is when you can tell them: What if it was not a free choice at all? What if you had seen the future? What if you were able to predict their choices from the beginning?

Ask them to read the prediction (which you have not touched)

Note: The name is based on an effect by Pablo Amira using gimmicked poker chips, called Poker Face

Conjurors to Learn Cups & Balls at March 3 Meeting

A typical cups and balls routine includes many of the most fundamental effects of magic: the balls can vanish, appear, transpose, reappear and transform. Basic skills, such as misdirection, manual dexterity, sleight of hand, and audience management are also essential to most cups and balls routines.

As a result, mastery of the cups and balls is considered by many as the litmus test of a magician's skill with gimmick style tricks.

Magician John Mulholland wrote that Harry Houdini had expressed the opinion that no one could be considered an accomplished magician until he had mastered the cups and balls. Professor Hoffman called the cups and balls "the groundwork of all legerdemain."


